# Mini-flat Half Pitch Package, High CMR, AC Input Photocoupler



#### ■ Description

**PC3H3J00000F Series** contains a IRED optically coupled to a phototransistor.

It is packaged in a 4-pin Mini-flat, Half pitch type. Input-output isolation voltage(rms) is 2.5kV. Collector-emitter voltage is 80V and CMR is MIN. 10kV/µs.




### ■ Internal Connection Diagram





Fig.2 Forward Current vs. Ambient Temperature




Fig.3 Diode Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature




Fig.4 Collector Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature




Fig.5 Total Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature






Fig.6 Peak Forward Current vs. Duty Ratio




Fig.8 Current Transfer Ratio vs. Forward Current




Fig.10 Relative Current Transfer Ratio vs.
Ambient Temperature




Fig.7 Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage




Fig.9 Collector Current vs. Collector-emitter Voltage




Fig.11 Collector - emitter Saturation Voltage vs. Ambient Temperature






Fig.12 Collector Dark Current vs. Ambient Temperature





Fig.14 Test Circuit for Response Time

Fig.13 Response Time vs. Load Resistance




Fig.15 Frequency Response





Fig.16 Collector-emitter Saturation Voltage vs. Forward Current

#### ■ Design Considerations

### Design guide

While operating at I<sub>F</sub><1.0mA, CTR variation may increase.

Please make design considering this fact.

In case that some sudden big noise caused by voltage variation is provided between primary and secondary terminals of photocoupler some current caused by it is floating capacitance may be generated and result in false operation since current may go through IRED or current may change.

If the photocoupler may be used under the circumstances where noise will be generated we recommend to use the bypass capacitors at the both ends of IRED.


This product is not designed against irradiation and incorporates non-coherent IRED.

#### Degradation

In general, the emission of the IRED used in photocouplers will degrade over time.

In the case of long term operation, please take the general IRED degradation (50% degradation over 5 years) into the design consideration.

#### ■ Manufacturing Guidelines


### Soldering Method

#### Reflow Soldering:

Reflow soldering should follow the temperature profile shown below.

Soldering should not exceed the curve of temperature profile and time.

Please don't solder more than twice.



#### Flow Soldering:

Due to SHARP's double transfer mold construction submersion in flow solder bath is allowed under the below listed guidelines.

Flow soldering should be completed below 260°C and within 10s.

Preheating is within the bounds of 100 to 150°C and 30 to 80s.

Please don't solder more than twice.

#### Hand soldering

Hand soldering should be completed within 3s when the point of solder iron is below 400°C.

Please don't solder more than twice.

#### Other notices

Please test the soldering method in actual condition and make sure the soldering works fine, since the impact on the junction between the device and PCB varies depending on the tooling and soldering conditions.



#### Cleaning instructions

#### Solvent cleaning:

Solvent temperature should be 45°C or below Immersion time should be 3 minutes or less

#### Ultrasonic cleaning:

The impact on the device varies depending on the size of the cleaning bath, ultrasonic output, cleaning time, size of PCB and mounting method of the device.

Therefore, please make sure the device withstands the ultrasonic cleaning in actual conditions in advance of mass production.

#### Recommended solvent materials:

Ethyl alcohol, Methyl alcohol and Isopropyl alcohol

In case the other type of solvent materials are intended to be used, please make sure they work fine in actual using conditions since some materials may erode the packaging resin.

#### Presence of ODC

This product shall not contain the following materials.

And they are not used in the production process for this product.

Regulation substances: CFCs, Halon, Carbon tetrachloride, 1.1.1-Trichloroethane (Methylchloroform)

Specific brominated flame retardants such as the PBBOs and PBBs are not used in this product at all.

This product shall not contain the following materials banned in the RoHS Directive (2002/95/EC).

•Lead, Mercury, Cadmium, Hexavalent chromium, Polybrominated biphenyls (PBB), Polybrominated diphenyl ethers (PBDE).
